Clare Boothe Luce

(1903-1987)

Clare Boothe Luce was a witty popular dramatist in the 1930s, as well as an editor of *Vanity Fair*, a traveling journalist, two-term Congresswoman from Connecticut, and Ambassador to Italy and Brazil. In 1935 she married Henry Luce, founder and publisher of *Time*, *Life*, *Fortune*, and *Sports Illustrated*. Although an eloquent advocate for women's rights, Luce is best known for her play *The Women* (1936), satirizing rich women and divorcees with Feminist attitudes, which toured the United States and 18 other countries, ran for 657 performances and was made into a movie full of leading women. Luce is unlike the radical Feminists of the late 20th century in being a humanist and affirming family values. Among her other plays, *Kiss the Boys Goodbye* (1938) is a political allegory about fascism in America and *Margin of Error* (1939) is about the murder of a Nazi agent. Luce was a strong voice in the fight against Communism, though in Congress she voted more often with Democrats than with Republicans.

AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL
